Due to the hard work of our treasurer and finance committee, we were able to structure our accounts to generate revenue, reduce management costs, and provide multiple options without sacrificing security. Many times, this entails pushing our creativity to the limit, but the end product is something worthy of pride.

As we move forward in our second century of presence and service, the Cathedral family will see a greater number of ways to acknowledge and celebrate our shared history. We'll continue to recognize those people that have influenced and motivated us in our journey as a Cathedral. We will continue to capture these stories of the past and the stories of the current so that others, as well as our current Cathedral family, may know and share in what makes us who we are. Opportunities will present themselves to share personal stories in written and video formats later this year.

One mechanism that will continue to grow and flourish is the Legacy Society of St. Paul's. Our Cathedral family, past and current, has been extremely generous when it comes time to remember St. Paul's in various gifts and bequests. Fr. Tim Sean Youmans+ Report

I am currently in my 12th year as chaplain at Casady School. I generally put in around 50 hours a week at Casady with an additional 4 to 8 hours at St. Paul's on Sundays. I was away from St. Paul's one Sunday a month to teach the Bible Year at our Iona School of Ministry (education for candidates for Deacon and Bi-Vocational Priests) at St. Crispin's.

Preaching and Celebrating. This past March I began my 11th year serving as an Associate Priest at St. Paul's where my primary function is part of the **liturgical and preaching** rotation.

Lesser Feast is a worship and folk band made up of a rotating roster of church members. We did a concert in the East Garden in May, and we hosted a "Woody Guthrie Prayer Service" in October around the day of his death. The service had 40 people in attendance. We brought our monthly "Rooted" to a close. The members of the band found it increasingly hard to find time to rehearse.

The good intentions were there, but the time to fulfill it was hard to come by.

The Bible Project. This is a general Bible Study every Sunday at 4pm, geared toward an offering that serves as a ramp-up activity for the 5pm services, as well as an option for youth parents to have a concurrent study during youth group. We average 3 to 7 folks. We are currently using the TV show "The Chosen," a dramatic rendering of the Gospels, to discuss a variety of issues of interpretation.

High Fidelity is an adult formation group that meets monthly on Sunday evenings before the 8 p.m. Compline service. This is a *faith* and *culture* discussion group that does a theological interpretation of essentially secular music. This past year we listened to the music of Oklahoma artist Samantha Craine, U2, songs about "Babylon," as well as a look at Traditional Irish Music. We have anywhere from 2 to 8 folks attend these discussions.

Sunday Formation. I taught an Advent Series on the "Second (Advent) Coming of Christ.

In October the St. Paul's Health Team provided the 20th annual Health Fair in the Dean Back Building. There were flu shots and various booths that provided learning opportunities to stay healthy. The Health Team continues to provide consultations as needed. Reach out to us!

The CAT team—Cathedral Action Team—consists of nurses, doctors, the Altar Guild, the Usher Guild, and members of St. Paul's. We are ready and prepared to help those on the St. Paul's campus that need medical help. If anyone witnesses a situation that requires immediate medical help, please find me, or any other member of the Health Team, Usher Guild or Altar Guild, and we will activate the CAT team. We are here to help you!



Deacon Gerald Butcher's Report

Things have not changed much in 2023 as a result of health issues for me. As you may know, I was diagnosed with Parkinson's Disease (PD) in 2021. Symptoms with Parkinson's Disease vary from patient to patient, and my symptoms seem to affect me with tremors in my legs, voice, eyes, and milder tremors in my arms. Fatigue is an issue too. Medication helps with these tremors, but it is not a 100% fix. Exercise is a big help too and may be more effective than medications, according to PD experts.

My normal exercise schedule for a typical week includes 1 hour of Rock Steady Boxing, 2 hours of dance for Parkinson's, 2 hours of exercise at Mercv Hospital, 1 hour of speech therapy. and 1.5 miles of walking. Since I retired from my secular job one year ago, I have more time to do these exercises.



Since retiring, I attend St. Paul's weekly staff meetings. This has made me aware of more pastoral needs in our congregation, which has resulted in more pastoral calls. I also led an Ignatian Group Retreat in Daily Life on a normal Sunday. I typically serve at the 8am and 9am services. Dean Katie and I have been cautious about scheduling me to preach. I did, however, preach Thanksgiving Day.

Dear Friends at St. Paul's.

Cathedral music continues to thrive and grow. Our Cathedral Choir and Youth Choristers continue to lead worship weekly at the 9:00 a.m. service. Over the summer, they sang services at the Washington National Cathedral to great success. They were well received, and we represented St. Paul's OKC in Washington D.C. to a very high level!



The next choir trip is planned for July of 2025. Our youth choristers continue an active rehearsal schedule of twice per week and have been offering choral evensong on the third Wednesday of each month. Together with our adult choristers, the full choir comes together each week to have dinner before rehearsal. This has been a wonderful way for our singers of all ages to enjoy fellowship with one another. The new but popular tradition of singing A Festival of Nine Lessons & Carols was put on hiatus this year with the shortened Advent season but is scheduled to resume in 2024.

Our Cathedral Schola presented a wonderful concert last April entitled "Music for Glory and Praise." This was in conjunction with the OCU Early Music Ensemble and featured renowned counter tenor soloist, Daniel Moody from NYC. This concert was made possible by some very generous donors. Thank you! The Schola Cantorum continues to lead worship at 11:15 a.m. as well as various other special liturgies and events. Though we didn't offer Nine Lessons & Carols this year, it was great to have the Schola lead the Advent Procession on the second Sunday of Advent. Another yearly tradition that continues.

I continue to be very proud of all of our singers in our choirs. They are very dedicated and work hard to



lead services each week. Between both of our choirs singing Sunday morning and feast day services, choral evensong and choral compline are offered regularly each month. These are important services in the cycle of daily prayer.

During the past program year, I am happy to have Mary Reynolds on board as director of the St. Cecilia Choir. Mary and I worked over the summer to reimagine a contemplative service featuring music from the Taizé tradition. We came up with a lovely liturgy and service entitled "Draw Near."

Mary's report is as follows:

For the first 9 months of 2023, members of the Saint Cecilia Choir, in various combinations, sang music for the Good Night Yoga services held every 1st and 3rd Tuesday. Beginning the first Sunday of October, our group was very happy to welcome the Draw Near: Contemplative Worship service.

Our census at the moment is 10 singers. I am eager, and the choir is as well, to welcome anyone who would like to serve with us. The music is not difficult. We sing very traditional hymns and chants as well as folk, gospel and world music. And we have a warm fellowship. I am happy to be of service as the leader of the Saint Cecilia Choir.

Acolyte's Report

The Acolyte program at St. Paul's Cathedral has for generations provided a path of spiritual growth and service for our youth. The program nurtures and supports the Acolytes and affords leadership opportunities for older Acolytes. At year-end, we were blessed with 20 youth between the ages of 8 and 18 serving as Acolytes and 17 adult Acolyte Masters. I have enjoyed watching the younger



Acolytes grow in the program and hearing from parents who say how much the Acolyte service means to their children.

The Acolytes serve at 8, 9 and 11:15 a.m. Sunday

services and during special services, such as Christmas and Easter. The roles vary according to experience. Younger Acolytes typically start as torchbearers. As they gain experience, they perform more complex roles, including serving in the setting of the Eucharistic table. We provide periodic training for new Acolytes and new Masters. To aid our training, we have an Acolyte Manual describing the various roles. The Acolyte Manual is available online.

We invite all parents to consider whether their children would enjoy the Acolyte program. The Acolyte program is open to all youth eight years of age or older. We have an enviable retention rate with many of our Acolytes continuing their service through high school.

Altar Guild's Report



Our St. Paul's Cathedral Altar Guild is responsible for 'setting the Lord's table' for every Sunday morning and evening service, for our Wednesday noon services, and Feast Day services, weddings, and funerals. The Altar

Guild works closely with the Bishop and Diocesan staff in planning various celebrations including ordinations in June and December.

Archive's Report

We have continued to organize, preserve, and make available records for inquiries and artifacts for events during 2023.


- **I. Records Management:** Continued to sort, to organize, to process church records, and donated materials.
- **II. Preservation and Protection:** Monitoring of temperature and humidity upon entering showed less fluctuation and more consistent ranges (T 56-74; H 45%-65%) closer to ideal for most of the materials. Exceptions were on days when outside doors were open for church maintenance.
- III. Acquisitions: Included church bulletins and other mixed paper materials; box of miscellaneous materials of Rev. Margot Lord Nesbit from family; and artifacts from around church including predieus and large, wooden eagle.

IV. Deaccessions: Duplicates of materials and nonessential old records (not legally required to be retained); previous years red, bound Registers moved to Diocesan office.

V. Archival Requests: Information for congregational members baptisms, marriages, funerals, and guilds; history of church; artifacts for display and events.

VI. Goals: Continue to process materials; be a reference resource.

I would also like to thank Van Bielstein who is helping with processing and filing of the records.

Audio/Visual Report

The Audio/Visual Guild is responsible for the livestreaming of all the services conducted by St. Paul's Cathedral. The guild is comprised of eight members who attend the services to operate the cameras and sound controls to ensure that the livestream goes smoothly. In addition, all livestreams must be scheduled in advance, and the credits are updated each week to reflect those who are participating in that service.

This was a busy year for the Audio/Visual Guild. Several things were accomplished.

Currently, all 8:00, 9:00, 11:15, Sunday evening, weekday noon, and Feast Day services are available online as well as in person. The livestreams are sent to Dean Churchwell's Pop-up Prayer Facebook page, St. Paul's website, St. Paul's Facebook page, and St. Paul's YouTube page. Also, several Diocesan Ordination events were livestreamed to the Diocesan social media sites.

This last year we have continued to experiment with the microphones in the Cathedral to enhance the sound not only in the room itself but also on the livestream broadcast.

New speakers were installed in the courtyard to replace the old speakers that had ceased to work. In addition, new speakers were also installed in the east garden to replace those speakers that had also stopped working. A portable speaker system with cordless microphone was purchased to allow for presentations to happen in the reception area and the garden gallery.

We have just started a large project to update the audio/visual system in Dean Willy Hall with a bigger screen for video presentations, new receivers for the microphones, and a camera such that presentations can be livestreamed from that location.

Also in the works are an update to the TV and audio system in the Chapter Room.

I would like to sincerely thank the members of the Audio/Visual Guild for their hard work,

dedication, and resourcefulness in keeping everything going smoothly so that the livestreams can be enjoyed by those who cannot always attend the services in person.

Children's Formation and Cathedral Life Report

Children's Formation:



We started out the New Year in the undercroft with vaccinations being available for most. It was finally a sigh of relief! We completed the entire Church School year in the undercroft. We have anywhere from 30-50 kids each week in church school with a wonderful group of volunteer teachers. We have church school beginning after Labor Day and running through the weekend prior to Memorial Day.

Our youngest class, 3y-K are using the Spark Lectionary curriculum, our 1-2 graders are using Godly Play, and our 3-4 graders used the Connect curriculum. The new curriculum has been going well, and we have continued to use it throughout the year.

We had Godly Play training in February with Teresa Phares from the Diocese and had a pretty good turnout. It was great to refresh some of our newer teachers with that method of teaching. Our Easter celebration was in the East Garden where we hunted for eggs and in turn donated funds in honor of our children to whatever organization got the most wooden eggs in their basket. The kids

really enjoyed giving back and don't fear they got a treat bag at the end.

This summer we had over 50 children attend St. Crispin's. Two weeks of our summer camp sessions were organized by Cathedral Staff. St. Crispin's is such a huge part of our children's spiritual development. We are thrilled so may continue to attend each summer.

The nursery is open with our wonderful staff and occasional volunteers, and we have anywhere form 5-10 children each week. We have expanded the times the nursery is open from 7:30 until after the 11:15a.m. service. We have choir members and even some 8 a.m. service people who needed it to be open earlier.

This fall we started doing Children's Chapel in the St. Nicholas Chapel during the 9 a.m. service. The children leave before the Gospel reading and return at the Peace. During this time, we read a kidfriendly Gospel, have a Children's Sermon, Prayers of the People, Confession, and a Collect, followed up by a time of singing. Having a less formal time with the children is enabling us to teach them more about our cooperate worship and why we do what we do. During the 11:15 a.m. service we offer a Godly Play story or read a story to those who are in the nursery during the service. While I know many adults miss the children's message this is going quite well, and the kids are enjoying their special service.



We preformed the Christmas Pageant in the Cathedral on Advent Three and had a wonderful reception back up in Dean Wiley Hall with a special appearance by the beloved St. Nicholas.

Cathedral Life: Throughout-the-year outings, meet-ups are planned to give people the opportunity for fellowship outside of the Cathedral walls. Some are better attended than others and all



ages are welcome, unless indicated otherwise. Newcomers are invited quarterly to come and go coffees with Clergy, Staff and

Volunteers; these are a great space to learn about where you could find your place in the Cathedral. Visitors are sent welcome emails after they attend where the Dean offers to meet for coffee or a phone call. We hope to make everyone feel welcome and connected at the Cathedral.

Lay Liturgical Leaders' Report

There are currently 47 individuals serving as Readers, Intercessors, and/or Lay Eucharistic Ministers (LEMs). Readers assist in reading assigned Scripture lessons. Intercessors assist by leading the Prayers of the People. LEMs assist in serving communion. These ministers serve at all four Sunday services (8 a.m., 9 a.m., 11:15 a.m., and 5 p.m.), as well as Wednesday noon services, funerals, and special services throughout the year, particularly for Advent, Christmas, and Lent.

Many serve as a Reader only. Some serve as Readers and LEMS; some as Intercessor and LEMS; and some LEM only. There are no expectations that a person serve in all 3 roles, unless that person requests it.



Ministry Scheduler Pro is still being used for scheduling. It has been a learning experience for some of our members, but we are working with the church staff to make it easier.

Two trainings were held this year: August 26 and November 4, and four new people have joined our ranks. More training is planning for 2024, so watch for details in the weekly newsletter.


This has been my first full year to work with this group, and it is an honor to work with these people dedicated to the Word and Service of the Lord.

2023 was another year of changes and challenges. Even though the year is not quite over, it is apparent that our total sales for 2023 will be significantly less than previous years, which negatively impacts ECW's outreach efforts. Light to nonexistent foot traffic during the week and the loss of available

volunteers caused us to change our open hours, which are now Sundays between services, 8:40-9:00 and 10:15-11:15 and Wednesdays, 11:00-1:00.

Outside of our regular hours, the "traveling version" of CB&G was present at the ECW Retreat in February and September and the ECW's Annual Conference and Bishop's Day in April. We were present at St. Paul's for Clergy Vow Renewal during Holy Week and the June Ordinations. In October, we were present at Diocesan Convention.

Mobile Meals' Report

Dear St. Paul's Family,

The St. Paul's Mobile Meals Ministry continues as one of the longest ministries active at our Cathedral (since June 1979)!

This year 2023 our small, however very dedicated team prepared and served a total of 1,620 meals. Our team consists of a team of 10 rotating chefs and assistants and a drive team of only 11 regular drivers with about 2 substitute drivers if available when needed. This sometimes appears to be an overwhelming task of preparing an average of 31-32 meals per week, but the team is undaunted.

We had the extreme pleasure of adding Jennifer Jones and Natalie Stanford to our chef roster for the year 2023 to cover meal preparation the 1st week of each month. We also added new and/or returning drivers of Gladys Prescott as well as Rick and usually Jani Hill. Our efforts would be in vain without our drivers!

Without access to our big Cathedral kitchen most of the meals were prepared in our chefs' homes and would be assembled there or in the East Building kitchenette! (AMAZING!) With the repair of the elevator and newly installed refrigerator, we are hopeful to be able to return to the kitchen in 1st quarter 2024. Our drivers would meet here at the Cathedral and deliver their 'routes' be it North or South

For the upcoming year, we are looking for a person or team of chefs to help cover the 1st week of the

month, or if available on another Wednesday, we can make it work! Many of our chefs pair up with a friend or two to make the meals for their weeks. If we have additional volunteers, the schedule can be an every other month commitment. If you are interested, please contact Sarah-Emily Steinhardt at the Cathedral office, or I can be reached at 405-401-9092 by leaving a message.

It is a very rewarding experience to be able to deliver a hot meal to our client list and receive their smiles in return. Some of our clients have even sent us cards to let us know that we have the "Best Meals" that they receive each week.

I am most appreciative of Sally Alworth that prepares our meal trays with a picture and a prayer each week and also often helps cover coordination if I happen to be unavailable. I express my gratitude each week and month for all of the efforts from this team and for what we are able to accomplish. Lastly, we serve a "Blizzard Meal" to our clients if climate weather is forecast to try and ensure a meal will be available to them.

Ending Hunger in OKC also sends out larger boxes to each client, we have 2 that our group received that do need to be filled and returned to St. Luke's Methodist church, where they are headquartered. If you can assist to fill a box, please contact me at 405 401-9092.

Below is an outline of the projects that St Paul's Cathedral participated in during 2023:

January – Donated toiletries to Educare family supply closet. Also during January, we had our Emergency Cold Sheltering event where approximately 40 people were housed, fed, and had laundry washed during the extreme cold.

February – Clothing Drive with clothes delivered to Dress For Success and Our Sister's Closet.

Oakerhater Guild



The Oakerhater Guild was established following the ordination of David Pendleton Oakerhater to the Diaconate. The guild serves to establish a relationship with the indigenous parishioners both at St. Paul's and throughout the diocese of Oklahoma. The Oakerhater Honor Dance has been held annually around the Feast Day on the first Saturday in September which was been held at the Whirlwind Mission of the Holy Trinity in Watonga, OK. This powwow is open to all tribal nations and starts with afternoon gourd dancing, then a eucharist and dinner for all attending. Following the dinner, a powwow begins. Other activities include a vacation bible school, sponsorship of indigenous children at St. Crispin's summer camp and a Christmas Dinner and gifts for the children at Whirlwind Mission of the Holy Trinity. This year also saw the first collaboration between The Oakerhater Guild and the Naucratius Society. The Does and Bows outing was held to reduce the deer population per Oklahoma Wildlife suggestions at St. Crispin's. Per the guidance of the Reverend Sarah Smith the hunt yielded 12 does, and Mother Sarah prepared the meat to be given to the Seminole Nation on which land St. Crispin's resides.

Pastoral Care/Lay Eucharistic Visits Report

He himself granted that some are apostles, prophets, evangelists, and teachers to equip the saints for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ. Ephesians 4:11-12

The Pastoral Care Team embodies the presence of multiple ministers working for the benefit of those who are experiencing both the joys and challenges of life. The members of the team include both clergy and laity who answered the call to be present and prayerful during those times. During 2023, we have also provided multiple prayer shawls to comfort and remind recipients that our parish is committed to prayer and support for other pastoral needs.

Each week, except during the seasons of Lent and Advent, Debbie Blossom lovingly prepared multiple floral arrangements from altar flowers that were then transported to those who were experiencing illness, life-transitions, joyful occasions, or to mark an anniversary of a significant event. In addition to the flower delivery, our team members initiated a new ministry to be actively engaged in delivering loaves of bread as a reminder that we are called by *Christ to feed my sheep*.



During 2023, some of our faithful apostles embarked on another new ministry during Advent and Lent to accomplish card-writing for those who had experienced losses during the past year. We are reminded in this ministry to be the hands of God, for "the Lord is near to the brokenhearted and saves the crushed in spirit." (Psalm 34: 18) Our faithful year-round card writers continue to send messages of hope, joy, love, and peace for

those who were facing difficult times, who were experiencing the joy of birth, or who had recently lost a loved one, including pets.

Our ministry team continued to provide Clergy and Lay Eucharistic visits to those who were hospitalized, homebound, and to families experiencing both joy and sorrow. The



average number of monthly visits was about 30 and the number of communicants per month was about 70.

Dean Katie Churchwell led a series of formation classes in the spring to address final affairs activities that can serve to assist parishioners in gathering information for funeral planning, estate planning, and a checklist for what to do when someone dies. This information is available to those who could not attend and can be requested by sending an e-mail to jhill@stpaulsokc.org. These resources contain a number of links to important documents that are also available.

The Caregiver Support Group was initiated in Spring 2023 and continues to be offered every other Monday from 4:45-5:45 p.m. in the Sun Dancer Library. Through a common bond of caring, those in attendance offered their hearts, their hands, and their stories during their journey.

During November of 2023, Rachel Kretchmar joined our team as a valuable resource for those who have experienced the loss of a child. We are grateful for her presence and the resources she can provide for this ministry.

The Pastoral Care Team is here to assist the members of the parish and the community. We are grateful for the many ways that we are able to connect with one another as we seek to serve Christ.

Verger Ministry Report



The role of the Verger at St. Paul's Cathedral is to assist the clergy in providing an organized, respectful, and welcoming service in keeping with our liturgical traditions. Our role varies from week to week from simply confirming

We are asked to greet and assist with visiting clergy, helping them to prepare for and navigate through our service. Youth Ministry Report

2022 and 2023 has been a year of growth and consistency for our youth program at St. Paul's. In February, five Junior High and High School students attended the New Beginnings Junior High retreat as participants and staff. This past summer, we had 41 students from 1st-12th grade attend St. Crispin's Episcopal Summer Camp as participants.



Of those 41, nine were from high school, and 12 were from middle school. We had three high school students serve as CITs (counselor in training) this

summer. In November, four of our high school students attended the Ignite high school retreat at St. Crispin's. The students learned how to articulate their own faith stories and faith journey through the creation of spiritual autobiographies.

We have continued to meet weekly on Sundays for youth group and have shifted an hour earlier starting at 4 pm in hopes that parents dropping off their kids can participate in Sunday evening services or formation opportunities. We have an average of 10 students each Sunday evening. The youth have given their time to taking care of the grounds surrounding St. Paul's, volunteered with Cleats for Kids, and have provided great ideas for future service opportunities. Our junior high and high school Sunday School has been following along with the lectionary and will continue to do so



for the remainder of the school year. We have asked for feedback from students about what they want to learn and focus on through Sunday School. It has been great to have their input and feedback as to what is timely for their faith journeys.

I am so happy to have joined the youth in August of 2023, and I look forward to seeing how youth continues to grow and evolve in 2024!
