Great Thanksgiving

The Lord be with you. And also with you.

By his death he has destroyed death, and by his rising to life again he has won for us everlasting life.

Unite us to your Son in his sacrifice, that we may be acceptable through him, being sanctified by the Holy Spirit. In the fullness of time, put all things in subjection under your Christ, and bring us to that heavenly country where, with the Blessed Virgin Mary, Blessed St. Paul and all your saints, we may enter the everlasting heritage of your sons and daughters; through Jesus Christ our Lord, the firstborn of all creation, the head of the Church, and the author of our salvation.

Invitation to Communion

The Gifts of God for the People of God. Take them in remembrance that Christ died for you, and feed on him in your hearts by faith, with thanksgiving.

During this season of coronavirus we will have communion in one kind only (the bread). The celebrant will consume the consecrated wine on behalf of the congregation. While this may feel incomplete to some, our tradition tells us that to receive communion in one kind (bread or wine) is to receive communion fully. We will return to communion in both kinds when we can safely do so.

Please sanitize your hands before and after receiving. To receive, move toward the front of the church when the usher indicates it is your turn. Please maintain social distancing from others in the communion line. When it is your turn to receive, you can extend your hands and receive the host, walk away from the priest, and then quickly pull down your mask to consume. Please replace your mask immediately after receiving.

If you wish to refrain from communion, you can come forward to revive a contact free blessing. Cross your arms over your chest to indicate you would like a blessing.

If you require a gluten-free wafer please tell the priest when you come forward.

TODAY'S MUSIC

Today's organ prelude is the lovely and familiar *Air* from Johann Sebastian Bach's "Orchestral Suite No. 3". The flute stop is featured against the string sounds of our organ. The organ arrangement has been made by Houston organist Matthew Dirst. Dr. Dirst is on the faculty of the Moores School of Music at the University of Houston and is on the staff at St. Philip Presbyterian Church, Houston.

The postlude is also by Johann Sebastian Bach (1685-1750), the great German baroque composer. The Easter chorale, "Christ lag in Todesbanden (Christ lay in death's strong bands)", is found in our Hymnal at No. 185 and 186. This setting for organ can be found in the collection known as the Little Organ Book (Orgelbüchlein), a set of 46 chorale preludes for organ.

The Offertory is a standard anthem in the English Church, "Sacerdotes Domini", by William Byrd (1543-1623). Widely considered to be one of the greatest composers of the Renaissance and one of the greatest British composers, he had a huge influence on composers both from his native England and those on the continent. He wrote in many of the forms current in England at the time, including various types of sacred and secular polyphony, keyboard, and consort music. Although he produced sacred music for Anglican services, sometime during the 1570s he became a Roman Catholic and wrote Catholic sacred music later in his life.

HYMN NOTES

All creatures of our God and King - Hymnal 400 The life of the founder of the Franciscan monastic order is most astounding. St. Francis of Assisi was born to wealth but forsook all for a life of asceticism, mysticism and charitable works. An early environmentalist, his "Canticle of the Sun" (on which this hymn is based) was the first genuine religious poem in the Italian language. St. Francis saw all of nature and everything - including death - as praising God.

O Jesus, crowned with all renown - Hymnal 292 Traditionally, the three days before Ascension have been observed as Rogation days, set aside for the special blessing of the crops. Written by Archbishop Benson while headmaster of Wellington, this text was first published in 1860. The music, arranged by Ralph Vaughan Williams, was first found in English Country Songs. This same tune in Ireland is known as THE STAR OF THE COUNTY DOWN.

Lord, dismiss us with thy blessing - Hymnal 344 The author, best known for "Blest be the tie that binds," probably intended this hymn for the last Sunday of the year. Fawcett was an English Baptist minister who wrote over 160 hymns, mostly to be sung after his sermons.
