AT THE DISCERNMENT MEETINGS CONDUCTED IN FEBRUARY,
RESPONSES TO INQUIRIES WERE COLLATED AND CATEGORIZED TO
HIGHLIGHT KEY AREAS OF INTEREST AND RECURRING THEMES ACROSS
THE TEN SESSIONS. NOTABLY, 65 INDIVIDUALS ENGAGED IN THESE
MEETINGS FACILITATED BY 10 VOLUNTEERS AND SUPPORTED BY 10
NOTE-TAKERS, TOTALING 85 PARTICIPANTS.

### WELCOMING TO ALL:

- Most comments expressed gratitude for our inclusive and friendly atmosphere. While there is a sense of pride in our openness, some suggestions for enhancement were made, particularly regarding accessibility concerns.
- Concerns were raised about the rough paving stones in the courtyard, posing challenges for wheelchair users accessing the wilderness ramp to the chapter room.
- Challenges were noted in engaging with newcomers in the congregation due to the size of the church, impacting opportunities to connect with both friends and strangers during brief Sunday visits.
- Suggestions were offered for enhancing the accessibility of the altar and the church's East side ramp to accommodate individuals with mobility devices more effectively.
- Creating a more inviting space was proposed, with ideas such as reconfiguring the seating arrangement to allow for more flexible seating angles, fostering a visually welcoming environment.
- Concerns were raised about the limitations faced by individuals with mobility impairments in participating as readers, deacons, priests, or choir members due to accessibility constraints.

## **PROPERTY**

- EXPANSION: The property at the end on 7th & Broadway (Amelia Building is for sale next door, listed at \$3.2 million) and it would be nice to purchase it to help with the kitchen and homeless outreach, purchased and made part of the Cathedral property Could be made into a shelter with showers and washing machines, café for the homeless, counseling centers for the homeless, etc.; shower trailers? Washer dryer; Cry room for babies; Look at acquiring property for ministry expansion; Senior Housing in Midtown, buy property and build housing.
- GENERAL: Needs a deep clean; Many areas need fixing up; Nice having an adaptive space where we can move things around to meet the needs of what we are doing; A sign

for chapel at 8 AM would be helpful; Coffee & food should be downstairs in reception area with programming upstairs.

- KITCHEN: We need more of a catering kitchen, and less of a cooking kitchen; upgrade/improve kitchen (for more outreach), new kitchen floor, the kitchen is not set up right. Needs face lift. Designed oddly, and not working now for way we use it. Need catering kitchen, open, sinks & countertops where you need them. Maybe don't need cooking kitchen anymore.
- CATHEDRAL BUILDING: Lighting in the Cathedral needs to be fixed. Acoustical expert for whole Cathedral building; better sound on live stream; Upgrades to the sound system to provide opportunities for livestream services. Make church a little larger, narthex, a way to get from chapter room to narthex for choir without going outside, Give Cathedral tours, better sound system in SPC, especially for live streaming. The lighting/darkness of the 5:00 service with only one usher and concern of the securing the Cathedral for that service.
- ENERGY USE: Need education on energy units that could help those at the Cathedral during the week conserve energy; Invest in programmable thermostats to ensure we aren't running climate control where it's not needed; Check out Solar Power of Oklahoma to help with energy costs.
- BOOKSTORE: Keep the bookstore open; opening the bookstore more often.
- ACCESSIBILITY: Accessibility issues; Ideas/discussion about how the altar could be made accessible; Easier access for the handicapped.
- BATHROOMS: Improving facilities/bathrooms to better handle things like emergency shelter, have space for lock-ins, other churches to use, etc.; Functional bathrooms behind the kitchen; A dedicated bathroom for children in the nursery would be a safer option than having them go down the hall to a bathroom used by people of all ages; Repair all the bathrooms; Toilets and the old infrastructure of the building that should be addressed.
- INFRASTRUCTURE/PIPES: replacing pipes; infrastructure issues; Air conditioning and boiler issues; Fix leaks.
- CHILDREN'S SPACES: Refresh the Undercroft/space for children; A playground "to protect our landscaping."

- More cultural diversity and more with Native American events other than annual service.
- Security at the church on Sundays- Child care beepers to alert to any emergency or other activity.
- I feel very happy that St. Paul's has an emphasis on spirituality offerings like the Labyrinth, Lectio Divina and lighting of candles in the Chapel.
- Youth Group and Choir: My kids love it!
- Ministry Minutes were mentioned to help older members with technology.

#### **STAFF**

- There was some discussion about how much the Cathedral relies on volunteers and concern that this manpower base may not be able to handle much more new programming.
- Ministry for home bound/shut-ins to visit, call, fix smart phone, or run errands. Minister with experience facing death, and other issues facing seniors. Retired clergy for these issues and team of people to ask if need help to transport to doctor appointment, needs a visit, just pick up for church.
- We need to fulfill our existing needs, such as more clergy.
